Letter from our Board Chair and President & CEO

In 2023, NCFL's 60x30 vision took shape as partners across the country joined together with us to coordinate and align their existing efforts and ensure equitable access to learning and economic opportunities. We fully anticipate that realizing this vision will have powerful and positive impacts in communities across the country in the coming months and years.

We're so proud to have a number of early family learning communities in our home state of Kentucky, including Franklin County, Fayette County, and Jefferson County. The spread of our 60x30 Vision can also be seen further afield with early work happening in Georgia, Michigan, and Arizona. We look forward to collaborating in 2024 to create systems of support in these communities that will deepen the impact of their ongoing efforts to improve the lives of children and families

NCFL continues to serve as a lead partner in Statewide Family Engagement Centers (SFEC) across the country. We're now in the second year of our efforts to build an SFEC in Colorado. Additionally, thanks to U.S. Department of Education grants secured in 2023, we'll be continuing our Nebraska SFEC for five more years and launching SFEC work in North Carolina alongside a suite of strong partners. Public funding like this is an important part of spreading scaling, and sustaining our work.

In October of last year, we were so energized by the 2023 Families Learning Conference, which welcomed over 600 attendees to our first fully in-person convening since 2019. Both this event and our national webinar series provide powerful opportunities to network and share. Strategic partnerships are also an important part of our efforts to expand our work, and throughout 2023 NCFL grew our partnership with the Adult Literacy and Learning Impact Network (ALL IN) and deepened our engagement with the members of our Family Learning Community Collaborative (FLCC) and with community-based organizations across the country. Additionally, a new equity-focused partnership with the Southern Education Foundation (SEF) will help us achieve our commitments to DEI across the southern region.

Our success in 2023 is first and foremost a testament to the commitment of our staff and to the strength and resilience of the children, families, and communities with whom it is our privilege to collaborate. We invite you to join us in 2024 as we work towards a family learning community network that recognizes these children and families as the foundation on which strong and equitable communities are built.



Learning in Community

In 2023, NCFL publicly launched our bold vision to align and coordinate family learning systems in 60 communities by 2030. Based on NCFL's legacy work and fueled by family learning community networks that include families, local governments, schools, nonprofits, and funders, NCFL is working to integrate family-focused programming across sectors and create greater access and opportunity for all families.

We're proud to work alongside community partners to design and implement family learning system blueprints that intentionally include socially, culturally, and economically diverse families as key architects in creating innovative and equitable solutions that increase opportunity, access, and outcomes for all. Current Family Learning Communities include Frankfort, Lexington, and Louisville in Kentucky. Additional communities in Georgia, Michigan, and Arizona are underway with more announcements expected in the coming months.

NCFL is equally excited to continue our Family and Child Education (FACE) work in tribal communities. Now in its 34th year, this partnership with the Bureau of Indian Education (BIE) works to promote lifelong learning, strengthen family-school-community partnerships, and celebrate the cultural and linguistic heritage of American Indian communities.

Family Literacy

2023 proved to be a very productive year for the Family Literacy team. We worked hard to establish a common understanding of family literacy definitions and practices throughout the organization to further solidify our collective understanding of NCFL's four component model. Alongside this process, we updated the implementation training manual and training slides to highlight our current family literacy programmatic structures.

We also developed and codified a seven-step process for pre-implementation which includes multiple resource points and two meetings that are held with family literacy sites prior to the implantation training. This has been very useful in clarifying information about plans and expectations with potential family literacy sites and setting sites up for success.

Our updated systems as well as a newly-created fourtiered coaching model have resulted in updated cost models for family literacy programming. By taking on a multi-tiered approach to our cost models and services, we hope to expand interest in family literacy services nationally while also focusing on equity of offerings.

Drawing from these updated systems and cost models, we held two implementation trainings in Kentucky and Colorado in 2023 and have five to ten trainings on the horizon for 2024. These trainings highlighted our increased collaborations across teams and verticals as they brought in both content specialists and trainers while also drawing on notions of co-design from communities.

From the Field



Family Engagement

NCFL's family engagement body of work continues to focus on three areas of: P-12, Birth through Five, and Out of School Time. We entered a new contract with Jefferson County Public Schools (KY) to support family engagement and early childhood efforts with core programming like Activate! Local, as well as coaching and technical assistance around family engagement. We are using this work to inform and shape a more robust P-12 District Family Engagement model to be piloted and fully launched in the fall of 2024.

Thanks to new grant funding, we have expanded our Say and Play playgroups from a Birth-3 to a Birth-5 model, allowing us to reach a broader group of families with this key early childhood programming. Finally, we continue to refine our offerings in the Out of School time space. In 2023, we strengthened our focus on libraries thanks to a Public Library Association grant, *Developing Practices for Authentic Engagement of Spanish-Speaking Families*. This grant kicked off in October and will build the capacity of practitioners within state libraries to meaningfully engage with and better serve the needs of Spanish-speaking families.

From the Field

As the second largest school district in Kentucky, serving over 40,000 students in the Lexington metropolitan area, Fayette County Public Schools (FCPS) is keenly aware of the connections between family engagement and student achievement. To support family engagement efforts, FCPS district leaders participated in NCFL's Partnering with Families for Student Success, a professional learning opportunity that presents family engagement research and provides practical strategies for using this research to connect with families.

Miranda Scully, FCPS Family and Community
Engagement (FACE) Director, celebrated the spreading
and scaling made possible through this partnership.
"We are on the mission to create FACE Champions
throughout Fayette County Public Schools," says Scully.
"Partnering with Families for Student Success allows
our district to expand beyond single trainings to create
professional learning communities focused on building
the capacity of our staff to best serve families. We are
reaching staff in various roles and at different schools
to provide learning that shifts beliefs and enhances



Family Leadership

The Family Leadership team had an exciting year filled with successful programs under our Activate! umbrella. Activate! National, funded through PNC and Kellogg, graduated its second cohort with 24 participants from 10 different states and communities. A third-year has been solidified with participants from year 1 and year 2 and will kick off in Nashville, TN on February 3rd and 4th. The third-year focus will be on co-designing anti-racism resources for advocates and families of the early childhood sector.

For Activate! Local our Tarrant County (TX) cohort graduated in June of 2024 with 16 participants. A Jefferson County Public Schools (KY) Activate! cohort graduated in May of 2023 and a second Activate! JCPS Early Childhood leadership cohort kicked off in early December. A new Activate! cohort began in the Denver, CO area in October using a co-facilitation model that we are piloting for training on-the-ground local facilitators to implement the program model. This new model will set us up for better seeding and scaling in the future.

From the Field

Mother of two Ra'Chelle Dennis learned the value of finding an educational community after sending her youngest son, Noah, to an early childhood education program at Martha's Table. Having experienced the impact that a passionate, multigenerational support system had on her son's development and her personal goals, she soon found herself applying for NCFL's Activate! National network. While initially unsure if her life experience as a parent would be valued or impactful for the program, Ra'Chelle describes her first session as eye-opening. "Sitting amongst my peers, having discussions on early childhood equity issues occurring across each state was empowering," she says. "Sharing our experiences and coming up with solutions and policy changes, really helped me to see how big and important an issue this is on a national level."

Through her time in Activate! National, Ra'Chelle developed a drive to speak up for early childhood providers. Encouraged to learn more about parent advocacy, she began working on ways to persuade mothers on the importance of finding a support community through an early childhood program, and the vital need for parent leadership in their children's lives. "The more we, as parents, take leadership roles in schools and our communities to advocate for our early childhood educators it will positively impact the outcome of our children's trajectory from poverty to prosperity."

Sharon Darling Innovation Fund

Established in honor of NCFL's founder, the Sharon Darling Innovation Fund (SDIF) exists to improve adult and child learning outcomes, leading to equitable, thriving families and communities. The SDIF Family Learning System Challenge, first awarded in 2023, recognized three winning organizations with \$30,000 each to implement their projects





The grant will be used to create workshop curriculum with families in Philadelphia and Dallas that will bring to life STEM-related lessons from "La Fuerza de Familias Latinas." The hands-on activities will encourage caregivers and children to develop science literacy and build the cognitive foundations of STEM learning.



Bright Beginnings serves families experiencing housing instability and financial hardship in Washington, D.C. They will utilize this grant to create an Alumni Support Network for families whose children have transitioned to kindergarten, with a goal of continuing support through high school graduation.



The grant will be used to develop a program that encourages and empowers parents and caregivers to take a more playful approach to parenting. Parents and caregivers will help develop and evaluate the curriculum, then the "Playful Path to Parenting" will be deployed statewide through parent-educator training supported by the Oregon Parenting Education Collaborative.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Progress Snapshot

NCFL is committed to a diversity, equity, and inclusion agenda that is woven into every aspect of our organizational structure, strategic plan, and program offerings. In 2023, we continued to evolve and grow our commitments in the following ways:

- Established a new 60x30 vision to guide NCFL's work
- Created and evaluated NCFL's first-ever DEI Learning Agenda
- Embedded our DEI commitments into all team work plans
- Provided opportunities for staff growth and support in decision making through the Equity and Action Work Group
- Continuously improved recruiting and hiring processes to attract and onboard more racially diverse candidates
- Added two mental health paid time off days for all staff, improved parental leave policy with employee feedback, and sustained all-staff meeting free blocks

- Allocated financial resources to (1) build staff capacity in DEI areas, (2) hire a fulltime Manager, DEI position to support this work, and (3) use research-based assessments to benchmark individual and organizational DEI competencies
- Evolved appraisal system to reflect a 360 degree approach, enhancing equity in the process
- Increased diversity in representation within videos, photos, authorship, and event speaking roles
- Developed free resources for the field including Equity in Family Engagement Toolkit and best practices for inclusion
- Established equity design principles to undergird all programming


