
Four-Component Family Literacy Model



What is Family Literacy?

Family Literacy is a **four-component model** that requires an intentional, deep commitment of educators, community members, and families around four main areas of programming:

- 1. Adult Education: Programs providing a foundation for adults wishing to improve basic academic skills, prepare for academic exams, enter workforce training, acquire English literacy skills, pursue postsecondary education, or meet other individually set goals.
- **2. Parent Education:** Facilitated time for parents and caregivers to learn together and gain skills that support various parenting experiences.
- **3. Children's Education:** Programs supporting the academic, physical, and social-emotional development of young children and older youth.
- **4. Parent and Child Together (PACT Time®):** A multigenerational learning experience where parents engage in joint learning activities with their child in their educational settings or self-selected spaces.



Why is Family Literacy Important?

- A literacy crisis remains across the US which prevents adult learners from reaching their fullest potential. Forty-three (43) million adults read at the lowest literacy levels (NCES, 2020).
- As a result of the pandemic, nine-year-olds lost ground in math, and reading scores fell by the largest margin in more than 30 years (National Assessment of Educational Progress, 2022).
- Adult and youth literacy are linked; by addressing adult literacy, it is possible to break
 generational cycles of illiteracy (Dollar General Literacy Foundation, 2022). Another way to
 say this is: when parenting adults reach their educational milestones, their children excel.
 This creates a multigenerational impact.
