The programs found much in common with their approach to infusing learning in everyday family moments from breakfast to bedtime. Additionally, the focus on reading comes at a crucial time, as roughly 25 percent of students throughout elementary school nationally are reading far below grade level, according to the National Center for Education Statistics.

"We've worked with all kinds of organizations on coordinated literacy efforts to take learning beyond the classroom and into communities," said Emily Kirkpatrick, vice president, NCFL. "Having a state take this on in a coordinated fashion is exemplary and we look forward to continuing the momentum."

Taking this step with NCFL solidifies Indiana's place as a bellwether of forward-thinking educational leadership for the nation.
